
Finance and Philanthropy



Increased fees for students don't mean more money for College. They are mostly used to make up for government cuts to University teaching provision. The College isn't better off but our students are being asked to pay more, through government loans.

DISTRIBUTION OF DONATIONS




Because of the way we teach at Cambridge, it costs £17,000 to educate each undergraduate. There is an obvious shortfall, which is currently about £2,500 per student per year, covered by the College.

This year, thanks to the generous donations from alumnae and friends, we were able to:

- Fund 40% of every Cambridge bursary awarded to Murray Edwards students at up to £3,500 per award, upon which over a quarter of our students rely
- Award 39 Blues scholarships, 18 Graduate research grants, 8 Language course scholarships, 2 Music scholarships and 62 Travel awards for internships and volunteering totalling over £30,000
- Provide 43 College Bursaries for Academic Needs and Student Hardship totalling £20,500
- Fund the on-going restoration of our Grade II heritage buildings, which this year included re-tiling the Orchard Court walkway, refurbishing student accommodation kitchens, and installing WiFi in all public space and student rooms in College
- Provide £180,000 of funding for a new 3 year Fellowship in Law
- Provide £250,000 for a Fellowship in Maths, which will be a linked appointment with the Faculty of

Academic Excellence

Attracting the best academics will ensure that the Fellowship continues to develop as a vibrant, well-rounded academic community, fostering an environment of academic excellence throughout the College.

Law has always been a popular and successful subject at the College. At Murray Edwards, we have a thriving community of just under 20 undergraduates reading Law, and up to ten postgraduates taking the Masters in Law (LLM) or Masters in Corporate Law (MCL). The College has its own Law Society, which is organised by the students, and involves talks, dinners and mooting competitions. Our results in Law are very good, with Murray Edwards students at both undergraduate and postgraduate level regularly producing results which put them at the top of their cohort.

Thanks to your support, we are now at 100% of our goal to raise £180,000 to appoint a new three year Fellowship in Law.

Odette Murray, will join the College as our new Law Fellow in October 2015.



Engineering Fellowship

We have a long and important history of Engineering at Murray Edwards. At any time in the College we have almost thirty Engineering students, demonstrating our significant contribution in the STEM field, as this represents over 12% of women in this subject area at the University.

With just two fellows currently overseeing the Engineering programme within the College, this is a key opportunity to expand our reputation for academic excellence at Murray Edwards, New Hall.

As a College for women, Murray Edwards is in a unique position to support women undergraduates and in turn has the ability to strengthen the results of women in Engineering with this teaching Fellowship, ensuring a role model in the field is leading tutorials throughout the students' Tripos.

Our aim, in three years' time, women that consistently matches Engineering at Cambridge, which is 30%.

We are off to a fantastic start with nearly 60% of the Engineering alumnae phoned during the Telephone Campaign, choosing to support this great cause. We are now over £50,000 towards our goal of £180,000 for a three year Fellowship in Engineering.

northeast China

After a terrible earthquake hit my home country of China, I knew I wanted to help make sure devastation like this could be avoided in the future. With the support of the Rosemary Murray Fund, I spent over one month in the Northeast of China. I trekked through the forested jungle, large mountains and rocky coasts, and produced a geological map for the Jiashan and Shoushan region in Xingcheng City. This was the first mapping project completed by a Cambridge University student in China. the experience allowed me to complete my academic requirement and helped me build new connections with Chinese geologists, which I believe is very valuable. I am truly grateful for the generosity of the College and the donors without whose support, this project would not have been possible.

Backpacking for the first time was one of the best experiences of my life so far and has only made me want to go travelling again after University. I wouldn't have been able to do it without the Gateway Funding and it has improved my independence, confidence and problem solving skills as for the first time I had to fend for myself in a completely different environment. Travelling opened my eyes to the different

culture there and how people live and cope in harsh conditions. Overall, it was an incredible experience that I would recommend to anyone and I am extremely grateful to the Gateway programme for allowing me to fulfil one of my dreams.
